Welcome!

Welcome to the first ever Soo Film Festival!

Over two days we are showcasing the work of independent and emerging filmmakers from the Great Lakes of North America while bringing movies back to downtown Sault Ste. Marie and the historic Soo Theatre. We think you will enjoy this year's selection of narratives, documentaries, animation, and music videos, all with a Great Lakes connection.

Our inspiration for this festival is the historic Soo Theatre. It was a proud day in March of 1930 when the Soo Theatre opened her doors for the first time. More than two thousand patrons flocked to the theatre in its first few days and, for nearly seventy years, it provided the authentic small-town movie experience.

As the business of showing movies changed, the Soo Theatre changed with it. It was converted into a two-screen movie house in 1974 but, as so many downtown cinemas were forced to do, it closed in 1998.

After sitting vacant for a number of years, through tremendous local support, the building was purchased and reopened in 2005 as a venue for live theatre and music performance. Expansion was made possible through a state grant to build dance and music studios. A windfall donation of lights and sound equipment, rigging and curtains, and comfortable seats provided a giant boost to the theatre's ability to produce live theatre. The Soo Theatre has now become a bustling center for arts education and performance.

From the beginning with its stage and fly space, the Soo Theatre was a place for live shows. For most people, though, it was a place to go to the movies. Many people still want that movie experience in their beloved old theatre, and that's where we and you come in. In this first festival we hope to help the Soo Theatre begin to reclaim that part of her heritage and re-emerge as a movie theatre in the 21st century.

Silent films, "talkies," Technicolor, and even celluloid film itself have all come and gone. First-run movies are now released exclusively in digital format. While many mourn the passing of the 35mm format, digital technology has been a boon to indie filmmakers. YouTube has changed the way we look at ourselves. In the digital age people everywhere can now afford to tell their stories to a worldwide audience. Film festivals have proliferated so that people can share the experience of those stories together. We are pleased to be a part of it and we are excited to have you join us.

THE VENUE

All films will be screened at the Soo Theatre, located at 534 Ashmun Street in downtown Sault Ste. Marie.

PARKING

The Soo Film Festival coincides with Sault Ste. Marie's Sidewalk Sales and Ashmun Street will be closed to traffic from 9am to 6pm. The closest option for parking will be behind the theatre in the lots along Oaka Street and in the Parking Garage. Use the walkway next to the Avery Center to get to Ashmun Street. Festival goers will also be to park on Court Street and walk through the Sault Tribe Administration Building to get to Ashmun Street.

HOW TO PURCHASE TICKETS

You can purchase all Soo Film Festival tickets and passes online by clicking on the "Add to Cart" buttons on the Tickets page or on the individual film pages. You can also charge by phone by calling the Soo Theatre Box Office at (906) 632-1930.

Individual film tickets at will call will be available at the Soo Theatre beginning 30 minutes before the film start time. You may pick up festival passes at the Soo Theatre box office Monday through Friday, 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. or 30 minutes before the first screening you wish to attend.

TICKET FAQ

If I purchase a single film ticket, do I have a reserved seat?

Single film tickets are reserved for a screening of a specific film with a specific screening time and date; however, having a ticket does not guarantee you a seat. You must arrive at the Soo Theatre at least 15 minutes before the scheduled screening start time.

Are festival passes good for any screening?

Yes; however, please arrive at least 15 minutes prior to the screening you wish to attend to assure yourself the opportunity to secure a seat.

If a screening sells out online, will tickets still be available?

Potentially – advance ticket sales do not cover 100% of the seating for a screening. To check on availability of tickets the day of a screening, simply show up at the venue 30 minutes before the screening begins and ask!

Can ticket purchases be refunded or exchanged?

We regret that tickets cannot be refunded except in the case of a cancelled screening. Exchanges, when possible, will be subject to a \$1.00 processing fee per order.

These runways have not only trained the Tuskegee Airmen, but also launched the longest combat mission ever, striking Iraqi targets from half a world away.

A DIFFERENCE OF RIGHTS

Documentary Feature, 1980, 58 min



Does an 1835 treaty make Michigan Indians exempt from state fishing laws? Has unregulated Indian fishing destroyed the fishery for sport fishing? Should the State of Michigan control fishing in the interest of good management? Is the controversy another example of broken treaty promises with Native Americans?

This 1980 film explores the history of the treaties, the interpretation by modern courts, and the claims made by sportsmen, Indians, and state officials. In the end, you will understand the commercial fishing business and the sport business, but you will have to weigh contradictory claims and judge them for yourself. The film does not take sides or offer judgments. It simply exhibits the evidence.

Set against the backdrop of a town's annual snowmobile race, this cinematic, observational documentary explores the American working class experience. As racers and their families pin their hopes to a 500 mile-long test of endurance, small triumphs and giant sacrifices are made along the way.

He has directed commercials (New York City Ballet, Swarovski), music videos (Small Black, Pitchfork's *Juan's Basement*), and contributed to installations (Matt Keegan, *I [Apple] NY*). He has photographed spots for Apple, Friends of the Highline, Google, and American Express. Northern Light is his feature directorial debut.

NORTHERN LIGHT (continued)

Director's Statement: The Upper Peninsula of Michigan means a great deal to me. My father grew up in Saint Ignace, and my family has lived there for five generations. I've always been fascinated by the region's frozen landscape and the lifestyle it fosters.

I spent two years in Michigan filming *Northern Light*. My filmmaking partner, Lisa Kjerulff, and I began photographing three families who were about to compete in the Sault Ste. Marie I-500, an annual snowmobile race in Michigan's Upper Peninsula.

This race was unlike anything we'd ever seen—a rich and dramatic community gathering and an undeniably cinematic spectacle. Snowmobiles hurtled at breakneck speeds around a mile-long oval track of pure ice for 500 miles. A crowd of thousands stood on giant hills of snow, transfixed throughout the morning and into the freezing night. We quickly discovered that beyond the loud, explosive action of this race was a community marked by genuine devotion and hard work—breakfasts before dawn, prayers before dinner, and naps after the night shift.

We continued to film after the race, capturing intimate portraits of these families as they were making it through the day. As we kept filming, the effects of the financial crisis took hold of the country, and the lives of Walt, Marie, Emily & Isaac and their families began to change profoundly.

We became captivated by their dramatic and unexpected stories. We decided to craft an observational film that tracks the intertwining lives of these three families—no interviews, no explanations, just the drama of life unfolding in the present tense.

We stayed in each family's home and cooked dinners together. We shared many warm holidays. Emily, Isaac, Walt, Becky, Nick and Marie and their families invited us into their lives with a level of trust and honesty that still amazes me. They allowed us to create an emotional film that immerses the viewer in the changing lives of working class Americans.

Throughout the production of this film, I was humbled by the stubborn work-ethic of the families I came to know. Walt woke before dawn to drive his eighteen-wheeler to Alabama, Texas, and Pennsylvania. In the span of a single day, Marie worked the early shift at Walmart, picked up extra hours as a cleaning lady, cooked dinner for her children, and studied for her exams late into the night.

The families of rural Michigan are the inheritors of pioneers and homesteaders; ruggedly independent and determined, living with hope in an unforgiving environment and retaining a spirit of self-reliance I can know only by example. I'm amazed by the footage we've captured—its quality not created by any technique, but found, in the genuine and generous nature of three compelling American families. I'm proud to have shared this experience with them.




