Welcome!

Welcome to the fourth annual Soo Film Festival!

This year we are very excited to expand to another downtown venue this year, giving us an opportunity to show more films and reach more people. Three evenings of features inaugurate the festival at Bayliss Public Library, just a block away from the Soo Theatre. Admission to the films at the library is free. The festival continues Friday to Sunday at the Soo Theatre.

The festival places an emphasis on Great Lakes films and filmmakers but, as in previous years, entry was open worldwide. Festival programming will feature international submissions from more than 15 countries.

Returning programs include a late-night horror feature (Friday Night Fright Fest); a selection of music videos and animations (Tunes & Toons); and a block of short student films, all but one by students in the Great Lakes region. This year we add a block of foreign films in a segment we hope to make a regular part of the festival.

Narrative features come from as near as Iron Mountain, Michigan, and as far as Australia. Robert Vornkahl returned to where he grew up to make Nowhere, Michigan, a tale of a man on the run for his life. A thriller in the grindhouse tradition, Shotgun comes from Down Under to headline the Friday Night Fright section. As You Like It, an adaptation of the Shakespeare classic, will have its world premiere at Soo Film Festival.

Documentary subjects cover varied aspects of Michigan. There is poetry and performance in Stone Circle; outdoor adventure in The Michigan Ice Film; and a controversial police unit in Detroit Under STRESS. Human trafficking is brought to light in Stuck in Traffic, Modern-Day Slavery in Michigan. Members of the Upper Peninsula Human Trafficking Task Force and filmmakers will take part in a discussion panel following that screening.

Sunday features a segment of Native American films, some featuring members of the Sault Ste. Marie Tribe of Chippewa Indians. Through the generous support of Kewadin Casinos, the two programs are free to the public. Tribal Chairman Aaron Payment will moderate a Q&A panel after INAATE/SE/, which was shot in Sault Ste. Marie. Filmmakers Adam and Zack Khalil will be in attendance with the help of the 2017 Sundance Institute Indigenous Film Opportunity Fellowship.

All films in every category are eligible for an Audience Award. Judging takes place during the festival. Festivities attendees are encouraged to vote for their favorites.

Thanks for coming out and supporting the festival. We hope you enjoy the films!

The Venues


All films will be screened at Bayliss Public Library, a Superior District Library, located at 541 Library Drive, and the Soo Theatre, located at 534 Ashmun Street, both in downtown Sault Ste. Marie.

How to Purchase Tickets

No tickets are required for films shown at Bayliss Public Library. Admission is free to films at that venue.

Through September 14 you may purchase all tickets and passes online by clicking on the "Add to Cart" buttons on the Tickets page or on the individual film pages. All tickets and passes purchased online will be held for you at will call for pickup at the Soo Theatre. Please bring your receipt (printed or viewable on your phone).

Individual film tickets at will call will be available at the Soo Theatre 30 minutes before the film start time. You may pick up festival passes at the Soo Theatre 30 minutes before the first screening you wish to attend.

Starting September 15, you may purchase tickets and passes at the door. We do accept debit and credit cards at the door.

Ticket FAQ

If I purchase a single film ticket, do I have a reserved seat?

Single film tickets are reserved for a screening of a specific film with a specific screening time and date; however, having a ticket does not guarantee you a seat. You must arrive at the Soo Theatre at least 15 minutes before the scheduled screening start time.

Are festival passes good for any screening?

Yes; however, please arrive at least 15 minutes prior to the screening you wish to attend to assure yourself the opportunity to secure a seat.

If a screening sells out online, will tickets still be available?

Potentially – advance ticket sales do not cover 100% of the seating for a screening. To check on availability of tickets the day of a screening, simply show up 30 minutes before the screening begins and ask!

Can ticket purchases be refunded or exchanged?

We regret that tickets cannot be refunded except in the case of a cancelled screening. Exchanges, when possible, will be subject to a \$1.00 processing fee per order.

I lost my tickets. What should I do?

If you have misplaced your Soo Film Festival tickets, please arrive 30 minutes before the screening begins and ask for assistance.

Director Statement: As You Like It is best described as John Wayne meets Shakespeare in the spirit of Gus Van Sant. Set in a contemporary American west of cowboys, Indians and ex-hippies (and filmed in Death Valley, CA utilizing the original language and an all-male cast including Academy Award Nominee Graham Greene), As You Like It emphasizes themes and ideas present in Shakespeare's text that are lost in most modern adaptations.

David becomes entangled in a small-town love triangle, forms a tentative friendship with his grumpy, gasmask-wearing, ice-fishing neighbor, and finds himself in the middle of a do-it-yourself meth ring with the local drug dealer. Just as he starts to feel at home in this small town, a wrong move tips off the conmen to his location. David must choose: will he run for his life again, or try to save the local people he has come to love?



Detroit Under STRESS

In 1971, the Detroit Police Department begins operating one of the most controversial decoy police units ever created to battle street crime, S.T.R.E.S.S. (Stop the Robberies, Enjoy Safe Streets). After one year, Detroit becomes the city with the highest police-civilian fatal shootings as well as the city with the highest police officer deaths.

For the first time in almost 50 years, hear this incredible story from the STRESS officers who were there doing the decoy work as well as the community leaders and activists who were trying to disband the unit.

Great Lakes Connection: "This is the untold story of a Detroit police decoy unit in 1971 called S.T.R.E.S.S. After 26 fatal shootings, this decoy unit became the platform for the first black Mayor of Detroit, Coleman Young."

Adam Khalil and Zack Khalil's new film re-imagines an ancient Ojibway story, the Seven Fires Prophecy, which both predates and predicts first contact with Europeans. A kaleidoscopic experience blending documentary, narrative, and experimental forms, INAATE/SE/ transcends linear colonized history to explore how the prophecy resonates through the generations in their indigenous community within Michigan's Upper Peninsula. With acute geographic specificity, and grand historical scope, the film fixes its lens between the sacred and the profane to pry open the construction of contemporary indigenous identity.

A **Q&A session** with the filmmakers follows the film. Tribal Chairman Aaron Payment will moderate.

Great Lakes Connection: "It is about the history of the Ojibway in and around Sault Ste. Marie. Both my brother and I (who made the film) grew up in Sault Ste. Marie, we think you all will find the film very interesting and it would be an honor to present the film back to the community. "

Director Bio: Adam Shingwak Khalil (Ojibway) is a filmmaker and artist. His practice attempts to subvert traditional forms of ethnography through humor, relation, and transgression. His films and installations have been exhibited at the Museum of Modern Art, UnionDocs, e-flux, Maysles Cinema, Microscope Gallery (New York), Walker Arts Center (Minneapolis), Spektrum (Berlin), Trailer Gallery (Sweden), and Carnival of eCreativity (Bombay). Adam graduated from the Film and Electronic Arts program at Bard College and is an alumnus of UnionDocs Collaborative Fellows and Gates Millennium Scholars.

As current 2017 Sundance Institute Indigenous Film Opportunity Fellows, Adam and Zack have received a Research and Development grant from the Sundance Native Program to develop a feature length script for a biopic film on Ojibway artist Norval Morrisseau.

Also, they are finalizing the contract for an additional research and development grant from Vision Maker Media for a feature documentary on the repatriation of indigenous human remains from libraries, museums, and archives. Vision Maker Media exists to serve Native producers and Indian country in partnership with public television and radio.

Making Waves: Battle for the Great Lakes

Making Waves: Battle for the Great Lakes takes viewers below the surface of the world's largest freshwater ecosystem and into the middle of a complex war for survival. Narrated by Bill Kurtis, Making Waves joins researchers on the front lines as they combat invasive species and work to restore native species in an effort to prevent a biological takeover of the Great Lakes.



The Stone Circle

The legendary Stone Circle is a triple ring of 88 boulders located on forested land in northern lower Michigan. Builder and host poet Terry Wooten safeguards this national treasure along with a dedicated group of poets and musicians, who perform by a blazing campfire to a background chorus of croaking frogs and howling coyotes. The atmosphere recalls ancient cultures that came together in family and community groups. For three decades, they have kept the oral tradition of poetry and the flame of art burning brightly. The film culminates in the spectacular performances of the 30th Anniversary celebration, a triumph of outstanding effort in the service of Art and Humanity.

Director Statement: Anna was a very important story for me to tell because it's the type of situation that could happen to anyone, no matter where you live. I decided to set the film in a suburban neighbourhood in a popular city because a lot of the time when you are watching a film about human trafficking, there's a false generalization about it because they're most of the time set in a foreign country. The viewer tends to think "Okay, I'm not going to travel to this location because that's where I'll most likely be kidnapped and trafficked". With Anna that's not the case.



The Velvet Abstract





In fact, it's her responsibility to herself, her ancestors, and Creation. With this realization, she finds her strength.


