This year we continue to screen films at two downtown venues, giving us an opportunity to show more films and reach more people. Kicking off the festival are two evening programs at Bayliss Public Library, just a block away from the Soo Theatre. Admission to the films at the library is free. The festival continues Friday to Sunday at the Soo Theatre.

Soo Film Festival places an emphasis on Great Lakes films and filmmakers but, as in previous years, entry was open worldwide. Festival programming will feature international submissions from 19 countries.

Returning programs include a late-night horror feature (Fright Night Part 2); a feature-length foreign film; and a sci-fi feature, sometimes accompanied by one or more short films at the beginning of the block.

Other blocks address various themes such as finding direction in life, what happens when family history meets world history, and the importance of natural resources - something critical in the Great Lakes.

This year we decided to mix it up with our shorts programs. In each of these, you will see a combination of short narrative and documentary films, as well as animation and music videos. We're excited to show you the wide range of student work and remind you this could be your first look at your favorite filmmakers of tomorrow.

We would like to see you at Saturday night's reception. This will be an opportunity to meet and greet filmmakers and fellow film fans while enjoying great food catered by local restaurant The Wicked Sister.

All films in every category are eligible for an Audience Award. Judging takes place during the festival and filmgoers are encouraged to vote for their favorites.

Tickets and Passes

A Festival Pass is \$50 and gives you admission to all blocks on all days of the festival. A Daily Pass is \$20 and gives you admission to all blocks on a single day (Friday, Saturday, or Sunday). Tickets to a single block are \$7 for general admission and \$5 for students and seniors.

Tickets and passes for the 2019 Soo Film Festival go on sale Monday, August 19. You may purchase all tickets and passes online at the Soo Film Festival ticket page at FilmFreeway. If you purchase tickets or passes online, please bring your receipt (printed or viewable on your phone).

No tickets are required for films shown at Bayliss Public Library. Admission is free to all films at that venue.

Starting September 13, you may purchase tickets and passes at the door. We accept cash, credit cards, and debit cards.

Tickets to individual films will be available at the Soo Theatre 30 minutes before the film start time. You may pick up festival passes at the Soo Theatre 30 minutes before the first screening you wish to attend. If you purchase tickets or passes online, please bring your receipt (printed or viewable on your phone).

Ticket FAQ

If I purchase a single film ticket, do I have a reserved seat?

Single film tickets are reserved for a screening of a specific film with a specific screening time and date; however, having a ticket does not guarantee you a seat. You must arrive at the Soo Theatre at least 15 minutes before the scheduled screening start time.

Are festival passes good for any screening?

Yes; however, please arrive at least 15 minutes prior to the screening you wish to attend to assure yourself the opportunity to secure a seat.

Can ticket purchases be refunded or exchanged?

We regret that tickets cannot be refunded except in the case of a cancelled screening. Exchanges, when possible, will be subject to a \$1.00 processing fee per order.



Set in the abusive police state of the contemporary United States, Empty Metal follows five groups of characters, each emblematic of a different extreme political ideology, as they attempt insurrection against the status quo: A punk band is coerced into a dangerous assassination plot by a family of militant Native Americans who are aided by a Rastafarian computer hacker who is old friends with a Buddhist hermit whose son is a local militia leader.

This tangled web of marginalized voices is as diverse and contradictory as the nation that spun it, but there is a common thread: All the characters teeter on the dull knife blade that is contemporary American politics, but they refuse to fall right or left. Instead, they lash out from the soul, and under the radar, in an attempt to achieve what their mainstream predecessors have yet to accomplish.



An Armenian Trilogy was created by metro Detroit jingle writer Dan Yessian. The film tracks Dan's life from budding musician to creator of some of America's most recognized advertising tunes such as Whirlpool's "We're Making Your World a Little Easier" and Dodge Boys "Have More Fun."

Dan's life took a dramatic turn in 2014 when he was asked by his church to write a composition to commemorate the 100th anniversary of the murder of 1.5 million Armenians. It continues with Dan's visit to his ancestral homeland and the triumphant debut of his music performed there by the Armenian Philharmonic Orchestra in 2017.

Canada C3 - Coast to Coast to Coast

Canada C3 was a Canada 150 Signature Project that connected Canadians from coast to coast to coast. At the center of this project was a 150-day ship-based expedition that began in Lunenburg, NS where the ship was based and prepped for this incredible journey. The expedition then left Toronto on June 1st, 2017 and travelled over 25,000 kilometers along Canada's coastline, the longest of any country in the world, arriving in Victoria on October 28th, 2017.

A diverse group of over 400 expedition participants, thousands of citizens living in the over 75 coastal (and mostly Indigenous) communities that Canada C3 visited, and millions who engaged virtually through various social media and digital learning platforms, acknowledged and learned about the real history of Canada, to discuss current challenges and opportunities, and to look ahead to building a better Canada.

Eleven-time Emmy award winner Corey Adkins tagged along to document the 22-hour journey with Stand Up for Great Lakes, including humored encounters with other freighters, a permit to do something special over waters restricted by the Canadian government, and the emotional landing at Whitefish Point.



In the wake of her daughter's disappearance, Jolene, a single Mohawk mother, is forced to pick up the pieces of her life and navigate an increasingly strained relationship with her troubled son David. As secrets emerge, their relationship faces its toughest challenge yet as they confront the reality of their situation.

This film deals with the topic of Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women in Canada, highlighting the impact it has on individual families and their communities.

Great Lakes connection: The film was shot at the Six Nations Reserve and in Toronto. Both locations are in the Great Lakes region and are in traditional Indigenous territory, a topic that is explored in the film.

The film, made entirely using found or recycled materials, is a "Wake-up Machine" to those who view it, encouraging green and sustainable thinking to a society that needs to pay attention and affect real change before it's too late.

It features Lake Superior and the native people who live on its shores. The documentary is about how these native people are fighting daily to save and grow their native culture after generations of assimilation. The director is a Flint area resident/journalist.

Feature Presentation - Canada C3 - Coast to Coast to Coast

Documentary Feature, Canada, 2018, 46 min, Color

Canada C3 was a Canada 150 Signature Project that connected Canadians from coast to coast to coast. At the center of this project was a 150-day ship-based expedition that began in Lunenburg, NS where the ship was based and prepped for this incredible journey. The expedition then left Toronto on June 1st, 2017 and travelled over 25,000 kilometers along Canada's coastline, the longest of any country in the world, arriving in Victoria on October 28th, 2017.

A diverse group of over 400 expedition participants, thousands of citizens living in the over 75 coastal (and mostly Indigenous) communities that Canada C3 visited, and millions who engaged virtually through various social media and digital learning platforms, acknowledged and learned about the real history of Canada, to discuss current challenges and opportunities, and to look ahead to building a better Canada.

Great Lakes connection: From the directors: "We sailed an icebreaker through the Great Lakes up the East Coast through the Northwest Passage and down the West Coast to Victoria."

Feature Presentation - Crossing Superior

Crossing Lake Superior follows a riveting 60-mile journey three men took with their paddle boards across a lake that is often a force to be reckoned with.

Eleven-time Emmy award winner Corey Adkins tagged along to document the 22-hour journey with Stand Up for Great Lakes, including humored encounters

with other freighters, a permit to do something special over waters restricted by the Canadian government, and the emotional landing at Whitefish Point.

Learn why they chose this kind of adventure to raise money for the Great Lakes Shipwreck Museum in this special documentary.

Great Lakes connection: The film is a documentary about three men who paddled 60 miles across Lake Superior on Stand Up for Great Lakes to raise money for the Great Lakes Shipwreck Historical Society. The adventure included centuries-old pictographs, an emotional visit to the site of the Edmund Fitzgerald, and a tear-filled (happy) landing at Whitefish Point.




