We were supremely disappointed to cancel last year's festival. We love movies but nobody should risk their life for them. We were curious to see how a year inside would be reflected in our submissions and we were not disappointed. The creative spirit overcame and the filmmakers found a way. You can see how in our Friday afternoon program 'These Times.'

We're doing something different with our Friday Night Frights this year. Because real life is sometimes scarier, we're featuring local filmmaker Mike Dotson's documentary about his team's investigation of a haunted house. Mike will be joining us for a Q&A after the film so be sure to stick around.

Filmmaker Rich Brauer will be joining us Saturday for a Q&A after his film Frozen Stupid 2: Open Water. He made his film entirely in Michigan and can tell you how he did it.

Other programs feature such themes such as fathers, teachers, and reflecting upon childhood.

Be sure to check out our shorts programs. We've got science fiction, animation, music videos, and documentaries to cover all the bases. The student films could be your first look at your favorite filmmakers of tomorrow. We even have a program devoted to films and filmmakers 'Made in Michigan.'

The festival begins with two evening programs at Bayliss Public Library, just a block away from the Soo Theatre. Admission to the films at the library is free. The festival continues Friday through Sunday at the Soo Theatre.

Soo Film Festival places an emphasis on Great Lakes films and filmmakers but entry is open worldwide. Festival programming features international submissions from 19 countries.

All films in every category are eligible for an Audience Award. Judging takes place during the festival. Festival attendees are encouraged to vote for their favorites.

Tickets and Passes

A Festival Pass is \$50 and gives you admission to all blocks on all days of the festival. The Festival Super Saver Pass is \$80 and gives you TWO festival passes for one low price! A Daily Pass is \$20 and gives you admission to all blocks on a single day (Friday, Saturday, or Sunday). Tickets to a single block are \$7 for general admission and \$5 for students and seniors.

Tickets and passes for the 2021 Soo Film Festival go on sale Monday, August 10. You may purchase all tickets and passes online at the Soo Film Festival ticket page at FilmFreeway. If you purchase tickets or passes online, please bring your receipt (printed or viewable on your phone).

No tickets are required for films shown at Bayliss Public Library. Admission is free to all films at that venue.

Starting September 17, you may purchase tickets and passes at the door. We accept cash, credit cards, and debit cards.

Tickets to individual films will be available at the Soo Theatre 30 minutes before the film start time. You may pick up festival passes at the Soo Theatre 30 minutes before the first screening you wish to attend. If you purchase tickets or passes online, please bring your receipt (printed or viewable on your phone).

Ticket FAQ

If I purchase a single film ticket, do I have a reserved seat?

Single film tickets are reserved for a screening of a specific film with a specific screening time and date; however, having a ticket does not guarantee you a seat. You must arrive at the Soo Theatre at least 15 minutes before the scheduled screening start time.

Are festival passes good for any screening?

Yes; however, please arrive at least 15 minutes prior to the screening you wish to attend to assure yourself the opportunity to secure a seat.

Can ticket purchases be refunded or exchanged?

We regret that tickets cannot be refunded except in the case of a cancelled screening. Exchanges, when possible, will be subject to a \$1.00 processing fee per order.

I lost my tickets. What should I do?

If you have misplaced your Soo Film Festival tickets, please arrive 30 minutes before the screening begins and ask for assistance.



Director Biography

Rob Christopher wrote, directed, and starred in the acclaimed fiction feature Pause of the Clock, which had its World Premiere at the Denver Film Festival in 2015 and screened at the Gene Siskel Film Center in 2016. In January 2017 it was nominated for Best Chicago Film by the Chicago Independent Film Critics Circle.

He wrote the introduction to the young adult edition of Sad Stories of the Death of Kings by Barry Gifford and edited several Roy stories for publication on the website Chicagoist. Also author of the book Queue Tips: Discovering Your Next Great Movie, his film writing frequently appears in Cine-File Chicago.

Director Statement

For many years I've been captivated by the Roy stories of Barry Gifford, which use a very spare and direct prose style to trace a boy's childhood. Unlike a lot of autobiographical fiction, they're not sentimental at all. But what especially appeals to me is that their power over the reader is gradual and cumulative; you don't even have to read the stories in any particular order, but the more of them you read the more vivid they feel. Because they really do put you in a very particular time and place, mostly the 1950s and mostly in Chicago.

I've wanted to make a film about Chicago for a long time, and it seemed to me that using the Roy stories as a lens for viewing the city's history would be the perfect launching pad for a documentary. My approach was really inspired by Terence Davies' Of Time and the City, Laurie Anderson's Heart of a Dog, and the work of Bill Morrison. In Roy's World we freely mix Gifford's biography with the fictional versions of his life as presented in the Roy stories to create a dream-like, composite portrait—an impressionistic exploration of both Chicago and Gifford's work.


Befitting a documentary about a writer, words are the thing: Gifford's recollections of the period, told in voiceover, mesh with narration of the stories by Willem Dafoe, Matt Dillon, and Lili Taylor. All three actors are fans of Gifford's work and were excited to be part of the project.

From the very beginning it was important to me that the film ditch a traditional "talking heads" approach. That meant no onscreen interviews, with Gifford or anyone else. No celebrity endorsements. And I also wanted to make sure there weren't any cutaways to contemporary views of Chicago neighborhoods, meant to demonstrate "how things look today." Instead, in Roy's World we strive to keep viewers fully immersed in that vanished time and place. To make you feel like you're actually there—which is exactly what Gifford's stories achieve. Onscreen, photographs and other materials from Gifford's personal files are intertwined with archival materials (including rare home movies, amateur footage, family

photographs, and industrial films) to spotlight facets of everyday life ignored in most documentaries about the period.

Animated segments by Lilli Carré and Kevin Eskew, illustrating key stories that trace Roy's progression from childhood to adolescence, provide another way of representing the Roy stories.

And binding everything together is an evocative jazz score composed by celebrated vibraphonist Jason Adasiewicz and performed by the cream of the crop of Chicago's current jazz scene. In fact, Jason composed the score and we recorded it before I even started editing. I wanted the music up front, not just lurking in the background. To sort of have a conversation with the stories and the visuals. So the sound and mood of Jason's music pervades Roy's World and carries you along.



The end result is, I hope, a documentary that conjures a lost time and place without coming off like a dry history lesson; that draws from primary resources to offer a neighborhood-level view of city life, of how ordinary residents worked, raised families, and interacted with one another; and that, through the Roy stories, suggests how these people, and Gifford in particular, were affected by societal factors such as corruption and racism—all themes which are still timely and relevant. And I sure hope it nudges viewers to check out Gifford's writing!



Mr. Emancipation is the story of Walter L. Perry's determination to put on a celebration that would transcend divisions of race and class. He staged an Emancipation Day festival that was where everyone wanted to be. Eleanor Roosevelt, Martin Luther King Jr., and Jesse Owens all headed there because, as civil rights activist Dick Gregory said, "The largest Juneteenth celebration was not in America, it was in Windsor, Canada."

A celebration of ending slavery sounds grim. What Walter Perry organized was the exact opposite of grim.

Imagine a miles-long parade. The smell of soul food. Whirling carnival rides. There was live music, talent shows, and even the Miss Sepia beauty pageant (the first international beauty pageant for Black women).

From 1936 until 1967, that's how Walter Perry celebrated freedom. Perry and his celebration got caught up in the overheated racial politics, sabotage, and race riots of 1967 in Detroit. His event never recovered from that year and, shortly afterward, Walter Perry died. But the spirit of Mr. Emancipation still lives on.

Director Biography

Preston William Chase is a seventh-generation African-Canadian and a descendant of William Parker. Parker escaped slavery in Maryland, and went on to play a key role in the Christiana Riots in Pennsylvania. It was his friend, the great Fredrick Douglass who convinced Parker to take refuge in Canada.

Born to a single mother in the Black community of downtown Windsor, Ontario, Canada, Chase went on to become a high school teacher. He is also the family historian and a passionate advocate for greater awareness of a historic Black community, time has forgotten.

It was a desire for everyone to know the story of his great-great-uncle Walter Perry that led Chase to pick up a camera and begin recording the stories about him from the elders in his community.

Mister Emancipation: The Walter Perry Story is the result of twenty years of research and five years of production.

Director Statement

Directing a film is the last thing I ever expected to do. I have never done anything like this before. I am a school teacher, not a filmmaker. It's just that I really wanted to tell this story of one man who once had big dreams, who somehow managed to bring people together across race and class divides.

I grew up in Windsor, Ontario, Canada. It's a blue collar city just south of Detroit, with a Black community that dates back to the days AFILM BY PRESIDING CHARLES (CALL)

of the Underground Railroad. Times were always tough in the community. But there was one thing that people could be proud of, the largest Emancipation Day celebration in the world.

And the man who made it happen was my great-great-uncle Walter Perry. I grew up hearing stories about the festival. It was much later that my godparents told me stories about Uncle Walt.

For years now, I have wanted to share those stories. I mean, here was a guy who came from nothing, and sold newspapers to make ends meet, who somehow charmed city leaders, and sponsors and staged an event that drew top sports talent, American civil rights leaders, politicians, and musicians to Windsor.

He literally put Windsor's Black community on the map and made everyone feel proud.

I wanted to capture that and share it, especially now, when we seem more divided than ever, it's possible to reach out, get along, and have fun.

Over the past five years, I spent many hours with the elders in my community, recording their recollections of Uncle Walt, and the impact his festival had on

them, and how it shaped their lives. I sifted through their old photos which capture so many joyous moments. I did it just in time, we're losing that generation, and their voices are still relevant today.


