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Welcome to the 2025 Soo Film Festival!

Thank you for joining us for another year of Great Lakes, Great Movies.

We were once again afforded an abundance of feature submissions to choose from which is a great problem to have. It doesn't make programming any easier but it is nice to see filmmaking on that level being done across The Great Lakes, especially Michigan. Once again, your support helps those filmmakers stay here and work here to strengthen local economies.

The festival kicks off with free evening programs at Bayliss Public Library Wednesday and Thursday. The festival continues Friday through Sunday at the Soo Theatre.

Our shorts programs once again offer a wide variety of films across several genres and even several countries. The international shorts screen Thursday at the library. Saturday starts with student films and is followed by a collection of shorts Made in Michigan. Sunday we cast the net a little wider and feature shorts from around The Great Lakes (Welcome HOMES). Please, do not miss the student films on Saturday. We particularly encourage student submissions and this could be your first look at your favorite filmmakers of tomorrow.

Our feature selections also have a lot to offer with drama, comedy, and horror all on tap for the weekend. For our Friday Night Fright Rich Brauer returns with Dogman 3, the long-awaited next installment of his creepy franchise. Sunset Somewhere is the feature debut from Michigander Christopher Jarvis. He will be here to discuss his film after the screening. On Sunday we close out the festival with So Fades the Light, a devastating look at the aftermath of cult life. Directing duo Get Super Rad are also returning filmmakers.

Our documentary selections come from around The Great Lakes and offer unique views of life in the region, you can see those in Block 1 and Block 12. True-crime fans will not want to miss 1969: Killers, Freaks, and Radicals on Saturday. Filmmaker Andrew Templeton spent six years investigating the Michigan Murders case and has come up with something remarkable. He will also be here for Q&A after the film.

Soo Film Festival places an emphasis on Great Lakes films and filmmakers but entry is open worldwide.

All films in every category are eligible for an Audience Award. Festival attendees are encouraged to vote for their favorites.

Thank you for coming out and supporting the festival. We are thrilled to once again welcome you to downtown Sault Ste. Marie for five fantastic days of cinema.

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Tickets and Passes

A Festival Pass is \$50 and gives you admission to all blocks on all days of the festival. The Festival Super Saver Pass is \$80 and gives you TWO festival passes for one low price! A Daily Pass is \$20 and gives you admission to all blocks on a single day (Friday, Saturday, or Sunday). Tickets to a single block are \$7 for general admission and \$5 for students and seniors.

No tickets are required for films shown at Bayliss Public Library. Admission is free to all films at that venue.

Starting September 13, you may purchase tickets and passes at the door. We accept cash, credit cards, and debit cards.

Tickets to individual films will be available at the Soo Theatre 30 minutes before the film's start time. You may pick up festival passes at the Soo Theatre 30 minutes before the first screening you wish to attend. If you purchase tickets or passes online, please bring your receipt (printed or viewable on your phone).

TICKET FAQ

If I purchase a single film ticket, do I have a reserved seat?

Single film tickets are reserved for a screening of a specific film with a specific screening time and date; however, having a ticket does not guarantee you a seat. You must arrive at the Soo Theatre at least 15 minutes before the scheduled screening start time.

Are festival passes good for any screening?

Yes; however, please arrive at least 15 minutes prior to the screening you wish to attend to assure yourself the opportunity to secure a seat.

Can ticket purchases be refunded or exchanged?

We regret that tickets cannot be refunded except in the case of a cancelled screening. Exchanges, when possible, will be subject to a \$1.00 processing fee per order.

Wired To Inspire: Riding the La Crosse Omnium



Doug, along with a dedicated group of supporters, embarks on a relentless fight to prove Maurice's innocence, uncovering buried evidence and exposing the deep flaws within the justice system. Their battle against the odds reveals not only the systemic racism and corruption that led to Maurice's conviction but also the power of determination, faith, and the human spirit in the quest for justice.

Kate Stapleton is a harpist, dancer, theatre producer, and author. She performs across America in a band with her partner and their six children, traveling in a 40-foot-long, bright blue school bus. She is also a birth mother. She shares the story of how her choice led to her current life as an artist and mother in her directorial debut as a filmmaker, The Inner Sea.

DIRECTOR STATEMENT

When I was 21, I got pregnant. I made the choice to place my firstborn child for adoption. This choice changed my life. I became a mother who was not a mother. I became an actress, a musician, an author. I married and had six children. I started a band with my partner, and we began traveling across America, performing shows on the harp and guitar.

The daughter I placed for adoption grew up on the other side of the country, and became a musician as well. We began to talk about performing together.


In many ways, this documentary is a modern-day, deconstructed, real-life Sound of Music. The reason that I wanted to make it was a resounding silence, which is what I have heard from birth mothers in the years since I chose adoption. I had never seen a documentary from the perspective of a birth mother, so I decided to make one. Their stories are rarely told. This is mine.



Luís Diogo was born in Guinea Bissau on the 26th of July 1972, when Guinee-Bissau was still a Portuguese territory. When he was 2 years old, he moved to Portugal.

He wrote the original screenplays from the Portuguese feature films A BOMBA and ICE. He wrote and directed the feature films PECADO FATAL, UMA VIDA SUBLIME (which became the most awarded Portuguese movie ever with 34 awards in 64 film festivals), and JÁ NADA SEI.



DIRECTOR STATEMENT

IDOLMAKERS is a thriller, with suspense and drama, based on a fantastic premise, presented in a naturalistic and credible way.

The film explores three intertwining themes:

The importance of idols for society, in terms of transmitting values and inspiration


Sexism; How far women are willing to go to achieve equality

Laid off due to a global illness, Byron is barely holding his life together. With eviction looming and his marriage crumbling, he takes a job as a midnight courier at a pandemic hotel for the unhoused, hoping to scrape by. But the gig drags him into the underbelly of a broken system where addiction, desperation, and survival blur.

Running odd and often illicit errands for guests, he soon realizes how thin the line is between stability and the streets. When a deaf woman vanishes and bodies begin disappearing, his suspicions spiral into obsession. Asking the wrong questions has consequences, and after losing everything, Byron finds himself on the other side—beaten down by the same system he thought he was above.

Thanks For The Room is a raw, street-level descent into survival and paranoia, reminiscent of the anxiety-fueled storytelling of the Safdie Brothers.

DIRECTOR BIOGRAPHY - BRETT M. BUTLER, JASON G. BUTLER

Brett and Jason Butler, the Butler Brothers, are Writer/Director/Producers based out of Toronto, creating original content under their boutique studio banner, Substance Production.

The Butler Brothers' most recent theatrical release, Purgatory Jack, arrived in the fall of 2024 after winning multiple awards on the festival circuit. Their previous feature, Unfriending, had a limited theatrical run in the US after also garnering critical acclaim during its festival run.

DIRECTOR STATEMENT

Thanks for the Room is a neo-realist feature inspired by true events, delving into the fragile line between stability and destitution. Like many people during the pandemic, we felt the harsh reality of just how precipitously close many of us are to poverty.


This film seeks to challenge the preconceived notions of homelessness, portraying characters who defy the stereotypes often associated with being unhoused. By weaving these portrayals into the storyline, we aspire to humanize genuine situations while emphasizing the truth that anyone can find themselves on the brink of poverty with just a stroke of bad luck.

The pandemic exacerbated societal divides and heightened paranoia, making these themes more relevant than ever, and we really wanted to highlight how strange and disconnecting that time and space felt. Interactions could escalate without warning or, conversely, become downright funny because of how unusual they were. We feel the film captures the raw, unfiltered experiences of those who

navigated these turbulent times, shedding light on the overlooked struggles we all waged during a particular moment in time.

People's strong and often single-minded opinions were, and still are, a major reason for the divisive times we currently find ourselves in. We wanted this story to not take sides or offer answers, but really live in the uncertainty that we all truly felt.

We took our cameras to some of the most marginalized areas of Toronto for authenticity and hope that comes across on screen, no permits, no tripods, just run and gun. By blending stark realism with deeply personal narratives, we feel Thanks for the Room invites viewers to question their assumptions and foster a deeper empathy for those living on the margins, and those with different viewpoints.



DIRECTOR BIOGRAPHY - JAKE VANKERSEN

Jake grew up in the 1980s, a perfect time to be a kid who loved movies. He could watch Spielberg movies in the



That love for films never dissipated. The day after he turned 16, Jake was hired as an usher at his hometown movie theater. As fate would have it, he was working there during 1999, the much-celebrated year in film, which only solidified his love for filmmaking.

Jake tried to explore other career options but couldn't shake his desire to pursue filmmaking. During an uncertain time in his life, he moved to Chicago and immediately fell in love with the city. From there, he turned his attention to Columbia College Chicago and decided to throw himself into studying film.

After graduating in 2008, he went to work for a Chicago-based company that made camera gear, rented equipment, and also produced a variety of web series. Working for this company allowed Jake to further his film studies by working on productions. During this time, he produced and acted in a web series called Hank Frisco: Galaxy Defender, wrote and directed a short film called Right, made multiple music videos for local artists, and made a web series documentary called Audition, which chronicled the lives of working actors.

Realizing that no one was stopping him, he went to work to finally make a feature film. Working with screenwriter Ross Compton and producers Scott Cupper and Tyler Core, Jake developed the film I Agree With You. The film was shot during five days in August 2023 and post-production was completed in June 2024.

DIRECTOR STATEMENT

With I Agree With You, I was looking to make a film like Kramer vs Kramer. Which is to say a character driven film about relationships, in this case long-term couple too afraid to confront their issues. I recognize that it is far too easy to romanticize the past, but these character-driven films used to be regularly made by major studios. I might have missed that time by a few decades, but I wanted to honor these films by making one like them. Or at least try.




Brauer has written and directed 11 feature films and hundreds of corporate, non-profit, educational and commercial projects. He enjoys supporting independent filmmakers.


So Fades The Light: Right wing extremism terrifies us. Not just because of the immediate effect, but also because of the long-lasting damage it causes. In So Fades The Light, we put you in a place where you see the effects of that trauma, and the harrowing journey it takes to rebuild oneself, connect with truth, and deconstruct the past while building a future.

The people affected and manipulated by right wing grifters and Neo-Christian leaders are often plucked from places of deep isolation and vulnerability. They are sold comfort by people who claim they are the only ones who can save them from an uncertain, painful future. And while doing that, these people have all their colors, stories, empathy, and individual gifts stripped away.

Folks who have escaped and deconstructed this life are brave and capable. They must face overwhelming trauma and things they once said and believed and the shame of that. They must believe in a new core truth—that they are good and

deserving of a full life and that, with the help of others, they can grow an experience that will not define them.

By subverting standard story structure and providing the audience dual perspectives on how our main character remembers their past, we show how religious trauma can cause individuals to become co-dependent on the cult leader as the keeper and narrator of the truth. But once the crack splits and light begins to peek through, time ultimately allows our hero to solidify reality and their compassion for themselves.


